NCEA Results:

To begin with we are very happy with the NCEA results of our Yr. 11, 12, 13 senior students. In Yr. 11 we had Michaela Clark, Courtney Parata, Anna Stuart, Ben Voice achieving Overall Merit Endorsements. In Yr. 12 Peter Cheesmur achieved an Overall Excellence Endorsement and Sam Flanagan, Lucy Neilson, Madi Pont, Amanda Voice got Overall Merit Endorsements. Congratulations to these students and to each and every one of the Yr. 11-13 students for their success. We had an overall success rate of 89.6% with students achieving the Levels they were aiming for. We are all proud of their academic achievements.

CURLING

On 5th December the New Zealand Women's Under 21 Curling Team flew to Finland to compete at the World Junior B Championships. It was a new team this year as most of the previous team had aged out, so it was a new experience playing internationally for the majority of the team. The team included current MAS pupils Lucy Neilson and Zoe Harman, ex-pupil Courtney Smith and two girls from Dunedin, Grace Apuwai-Bishop and Rachael Pitts. There were a total of 20 women's teams that were split into three pools. We played Denmark, Germany, Slovenia, Australia, Scotland and Latvia. After the pool games we had three wins and three losses, so to qualify for quarterfinals it came down to our overall last stone draw which was good enough to allow us to get through. We came up against Denmark in the quarter finals who we had previously lost to in our round robin 8-6. It was a much closer game in the quarterfinals but unfortunately we still lost 5-4 which ended our journey for this year. Denmark however continued on to finish placing third and qualify for the World Junior A Championships in Russia. Overall it was an amazing experience for everyone in the team and we are extremely proud to have made it through the pool play. We are now ready to train and improve both as individuals and a team so we can go back next year and build on our experience, and hopefully get to the medal podium! A big thank you to everyone in the community who helped to get us to get there by supporting our fundraising throughout the year.

YOUTH OLYMPICS


On 6th January Lucy Neilson, William Becker, Zoe Harman and Hunter Walker flew to Lausanne, Switzerland for the Winter Youth Olympic Games 2020. We were welcomed to the Olympic Games with an official opening ceremony where there were multiple performances displayed, all of which were done by young performers. We travelled a couple hours each day to the

alpine village of Champery where the curling arena was located. There were 24 countries competing in the Mixed Fours Curling. In our pool was Slovenia, France, Turkey, Norway, and Great Britain. We won four out of five of our round robin games which left us top of our pool and through to the quarterfinals. We played Germany in the quarterfinals and won 7-4. This meant we went on to play Japan in the semi finals which we lost 8-4. The next day we played the bronze medal match against Russia, but after going down six points after the first two ends we couldn't quite fight back and lost 9-5. However, a fourth placing is the best result for a New Zealand Youth Olympic Curling team so it was a huge achievement in the world of curling. We always kept a positive attitude throughout the whole tournament and the tough games. We were so grateful to not only our kiwi supporters in Switzerland with us, but also the whole community back home who were

supporting and following us on our journey. It was an amazing experience which we are all very grateful to have received the opportunity. *Lucy Neilson*

UNIFORM

Students are expected to take pride in their uniform and wear it as required. It is worn at school, when travelling to and from school, and at school events as appropriate. All uniform items must be clearly named.

- Details of the uniform are on our school website. Students are also expected and encouraged to take pride in their general appearance and conform to the following guidelines.
- Hair should be clean, and tied back if it is longer than collar length. Dyed hair and extreme hairstyles are not permitted at school.
- The only items of jewellery permitted are sleepers or plain studs (one per ear), a watch, a culturally significant item such as a Taonga worn around the neck (and under the uniform). Other body piercings (e.g. nose, eyebrow) must be free of jewellery during the school day.
- Make-up and nail polish are not to be worn at school.
- Male students must be clean shaven.
- Dress guidelines are issued prior to any mufti days.





Accepted waste in this programme:

All writing instruments (except for wooden pencils, crayons and chalk) are accepted:

Any brand of pen, felt tip, highlighter, marker, correction fluid pot (must be empty), correction tape, mechanical pencil and eraser pen regardless of their composition.

Note that we do not accept glue sticks, erasers, rulers or other cutting objects that could disturb the recycling process. Please be careful not to include any of those items.

What happens to the waste? Once collected, the writing instruments are cleaned and melted into hard plastic that can be remoulded to make new recycled products.

How awesome is that?!?!
