Kia ora parents and caregivers,

We have had a settled and focused start to term 3. It has been great to start the term with little disruption, it allows us to focus firmly on teaching and learning.

We now have new obligations around absence reporting. For every absence we need to provide detail around the reasons for the absence. When you call, text or email in, please be sure to provide information around why your child is absent. As the Ministry of Education currently has a nationwide focus on attendance, we will also be sending out letters when attendance is at a level of concern. We appreciate when children are kept home due to ill health, but we do encourage families to minimise disruption to learning. We know that it is challenging for children to catch up on missed learning, and that there is a strong link between achievement and attendance rates.

A highlight of the term will be the formal opening of the new school. This is scheduled for 14th September and we are delighted to have the Governor General, Her Excellency Dame Cindy Kiro as the guest of honour at this event. Her Excellency will, along with Mr Joe Ferdinands, have the honour of unveiling the plaque to formally open the school. We know this will be a very special celebration of our new facilities, and we will provide more information about this event in the next two weeks

I can also announce that the gym redevelopment is due to start mid-August. We are thrilled that this project will soon be underway. It will be exciting to bring the gym up to the standard of the rest of our learning spaces. The new gym will also provide a dedicated weights area and senior classroom space. While the construction will no doubt cause some logistical challenges and disruptions, we are looking forward to having another facility that we can be truly proud of.

On a final note, our PRIDE value this term is 'respect'. Assemblies so far have focused on respecting ourselves by setting high expectations of ourselves, respecting those who make a positive difference in the world and respecting diversity. We thank you for your support of these messages at home.

We learnt how innovation plays a crucial role in adding value to primary products such as peaches, apples, cherries, and grapes. Both visits were very informative and gave us valuable insights into the agriculture industry. It was surprising to see the amount of knowledge, sophisticated inputs, and innovative techniques that go into fruit cultivation and winemaking. Another theme that came up was about how products must have a 'story' for them to sell into the market. It's the 'why' consumers should want to buy their products, and it includes reasons like locality and land, the people behind it, and the story behind each harvest. This topic went hand in hand with our existing business knowledge and the concept of pūtake.

The visits to Webb's Fruit and Vicey were incredibly educational and a great opportunity to fully appreciate the complex processes in the agriculture industry. A huge thanks is given to Simon Webb, James Dicey, and Matt Dicey for allowing us to visit their businesses and take the time out of their day to educate us. It was a lovely day out for our class, as we also had a delicious lunch at Nichol's Garden Cafe, towering ice creams, and a little detour on the way to the vineyard.

SCIENCE ACADEMY

In early July, the Science Academy winter camp in Dunedin commenced. My cohort stayed at the Tolcarne Boarding Residence and we went down to the university campus each day for the projects and electives. Mine were chemistry, psychology, and biochemistry.

For chemistry, we went to the Mellor Labs and had an exciting time dyeing lab coats and t-shirts using dyes derived from various plants. We synthesized indigo dye and brown/orange dye from the native plant raurekau.

In Psychology, we conducted several experiments. One of them involved a visit to the Otago Museum. We all looked at the same set of artifacts but half of the group took photos, while the other half solely looked at the objects. Later on, we did a memory test to determine whether taking photos would enhance our memory compared to not taking photos. We found that the group that didn't take photos had a better memory of what artifacts we looked at.

In Biochemistry, we drew out blood from our fingertips to measure our lactate, cholesterol levels, and glucose. We also got to design and carry out our own experiments. Our group decided to measure our glucose levels before and after drinking 500ml of standard Coke, Mountain Dew, Diet Coke, and Coke Zero. We found that the drinks that contained sugar increased our blood glucose levels, whereas the no-sugar drinks didn't increase our glucose and it stayed relatively flat.

The Science Academy is a wonderful programme for individuals interested in science and meeting like-minded students from all over NZ. I definitely recommend upcoming Year 13 students to apply for this programme. It's a great opportunity to learn about science topics outside of school and at a more advanced level, taught by scientists and professors.


















SCIENCE EXTENSION PROGRAMME

At the end of May and the middle of June I attended a science extension programme run by the University of Otago.

On the first day of the May programme we went to the Portobello Marine Lab, met our teams and decided on our projects for each group. We then stayed on Quarantine Island for the night and played cards with everyone.

For the second day we took the boat Polaris II and went into the inner harbour to collect sample research for our projects.

After we took three samples in the inner harbour we used microphones and a zooplankton guide to identify and count each individual zooplankton.

While we were counting as a team the boat took us to three different sites in the outer harbour where we took a sample and analysed it at each site.

We did the same thing that night and the next morning but instead of going to the inner harbour we went straight to the outer harbour and took our last two samples there.

We then returned to the lab and started to analyse and graph our data in groups.

On our first day of the June program we finished our data analysis and began both our spoken and novel presentations. We then stayed on the island again for the night and were given a tour of the buildings, graveyard and grass areas, after this we had a game night in the hall with everyone and went back to the lodge for cards and food.

The next morning we took the boat back to Portobello Marine Lab where we finished both presentations and presented them for parents, students and teachers from the University and our mentors.
