In 2023, 31% of students at Maniototo Area School had less than an 80% attendance rate - this equates to missing at least one day of school per fortnight. I know some will tire of hearing our repeated messages over attendance, but we do this as part of our unwavering commitment to help our students learn. Please support us by getting students to school consistently. We appreciate students do get sick and need time off, but erratic attendance throughout the year really does hold children back. I encourage you to make a time to meet with me if you do have concerns around absence rates.

Our focus this year is very much on learning, we are committed to ensuring students make steady progress across all subject areas. As part of this we are working on developing learning resilience and persistence. We look forward to telling you more about this at our whānau evening on 22 February. This starts at 5pm and will include a BBQ courtesy of the PTA, and some family activities and games. We look forward to seeing you there.

I would like to formally acknowledge Olivia Russell and Jack Steele who have returned from competing in the Youth Olympics in South Korea. How wonderful for students from Maniototo Area School to represent their country in such a fantastic competition. Jake Smith has returned from his time in the development programme for luge, also held in South Korea. It is great to see our students succeed at the highest level.


