**NZASA Music Camp** 

In the Term 3 holidays, Year 11 students Madi Hawkes and Trisha Buragay travelled to Christchurch to take part in the biannual New Zealand Area Schools' Music Performance Camp.

The camp brings together students from area schools across Aotearoa to collaborate, form bands, and develop songs to performance standard. Participants are randomly placed into groups and work alongside experienced music mentors to select, arrange, and refine their songs. After two intensive days of rehearsal, the bands perform live in front of an audience, with students also able to gain NCEA Music credits through their performances.

Madi was part of a band with five vocalists, a drummer, and lead and bass guitarists.

Together they performed Before He Cheats by Carrie Underwood and Leonard Cohen's classic Hallelujah. Madi's role involved both solo vocals and harmonies, and the band's polished performance was warmly received by the audience.

Trisha took on the challenge of being lead vocalist for her band, performing three songs:
Santeria by Sublime, I'm Not the Only One by Sam Smith, and Nothing Holding Me Back by
Shawn Mendes. Learning the lyrics and delivering each song with the confidence and stage


